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Overview

Summary

Submitted in accordance with section 13(1)(b) of the *Election Act*, this report describes the proceedings, the results and the costs of the April 19, 2012 by-elections in the Port Moody-Coquitlam and Chilliwack-Hope electoral districts.

The Port Moody-Coquitlam by-election was called following the resignation of Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) Iain Black. Contested by three candidates, the by-election resulted in the election of BC NDP candidate, Joe Trasolini.

Voter turnout in Port Moody-Coquitlam was 32.07% and the by-election cost Elections BC \$502,795 to administer.

The Chilliwack-Hope by-election was called following the resignation of Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) Barry Penner. Contested by four candidates, the by-election resulted in the election of BC NDP candidate, Gwen O'Mahony.

Voter turnout in Chilliwack-Hope was 41.12% and the by-election cost Elections BC \$467,184 to administer.

Orders for by-elections

On October 3, 2011, Iain Black resigned as the MLA for the Port Moody-Coquitlam electoral district and on January 9, 2012, Barry Penner resigned as the MLA for the Chilliwack-Hope electoral district.

Pursuant to section 35 of the *Constitution Act*, the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly informed the Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) of each vacancy by means of a warrant. The Chief Electoral Officer received the warrant for Port Moody-Coquitlam on October 6, 2011 and the warrant for Chilliwack-Hope on January 30, 2012. As the writ for a by-election must be issued within six months after receipt of the warrant by the Chief Electoral Officer, the last possible date for calling the Port Moody-Coquitlam by-election was April 7, 2012 and the last possible date for calling the Chilliwack-Hope by-election was July 30, 2012.

Both by-elections were called on March 22, 2012 when the Lieutenant Governor in Council ordered that writs of election be issued by the Chief Electoral Officer for Port Moody-Coquitlam and Chilliwack-Hope. The writs ordered that the by-elections be held on Thursday, April 19, 2012.

By-election calendar

The calendar of events for an election is prescribed by the *Election Act*. It begins on Day 0 when the writ for the election is issued and the election is called. General Voting Day for the election is 28 days after Day 0.

*In accordance with section 56 of the *Election Act*, ordinary nominations close at 1 p.m. (Pacific time) on Day 10, but if this day is a Sunday, that event is moved forward to the next day that is not a Sunday or a holiday.

**In accordance with section 128 of the *Election Act*, final count normally begins on Day 41 (in this case, Wednesday, May 2, 2012). However, the Chief Electoral Officer authorized that final count be moved to Day 39 (Monday, April 30, 2012). This was possible due to the low number of absentee ballots cast and the fact that in the case of only two concurrent by-elections, there were few absentee ballots cast in each electoral district.

Arranging telephone and network infrastructure for district electoral offices on short notice has always been a challenge for Elections BC due to the long lead times required by telecommunications providers and the lack of certainty around when a by-election may be called. It has sometimes been the case in by-elections that District Electoral Officers have been without technology for the first few days after the writ is issued.

The Port Moody-Coquitlam and Chilliwack-Hope by-elections gave Elections BC the opportunity to pilot the use of cell phones, laptops, cable internet and secure wireless networking technology in the district electoral offices. These technologies require much shorter lead times and enabled both District Electoral Officers and their staff to begin working immediately upon the issuance of the writs.

While not all of these technologies are available in all locations around the province, the success of the pilots in Port Moody-Coquitlam and Chilliwack-Hope means that Elections BC will look to use these new technologies whenever practicable.

Nomination of candidates

The *Election Act* provides two methods for nominating candidates: standing nominations and ordinary nominations. For a by-election, standing nominations may

be submitted to the Chief Electoral Officer at any time until 4:30 p.m. (Pacific time) on Day 5. Ordinary nominations may be submitted to the District Electoral Officer during the ordinary nomination period, which began at 9 a.m. on Day 6 and ended at 1 p.m. (Pacific time) on Nomination Day, Day 11.

The period for submitting standing nominations for both by-elections closed at 4:30 p.m. on March 27, 2012. One candidate in Chilliwack-Hope filed a standing nomination.

The ordinary nomination period was from 9 a.m. on March 28, 2012, to 1 p.m. on April 2, 2012, during which three candidates were nominated in Port Moody-Coquitlam and three additional candidates were nominated in Chilliwack-Hope.

Voter registration

Only individuals who are registered to vote may vote in a provincial election or by-election. To register an individual must be: a Canadian citizen, 18 years or older on General Voting Day, a resident of British Columbia for six months immediately preceding General Voting Day, and not be disqualified from voting.

Elections BC offers many opportunities to register as a voter. Individuals may register online using the Online Voter Registration system; by telephone; in person at a district electoral office, or at Elections BC headquarters; or by submitting a voter registration application by mail, fax or email.

The period between Day 7 and Day 30 of an election is known as the 'closed period for general registration'. During this period, Elections BC finalizes updates to the voters list and prints Where to Vote cards and voting books. General registration for individuals residing in Port Moody-Coquitlam and Chilliwack-Hope was suspended and these individuals could only register when they vote. Voters outside of these

electoral districts could continue to register throughout the by-election period. The closed period for general registration for the by-elections began on March 30, 2012. During the closed period, voters could only register in conjunction with voting. To do so, individuals are required to prove their identity and place of residence either by presenting identification, or through a process known as vouching.

When the writ was issued, there were 35,693 registered voters in Port Moody-Coquitlam. At the close of general voting on General Voting Day, the number of registered voters in the electoral district had increased to 35,991.

When the writ was issued in Chilliwack-Hope, there were 34,344 registered voters on the voters list. At the close of general voting on General Voting Day, the number of registered voters in Chilliwack-Hope had increased to 35,020.

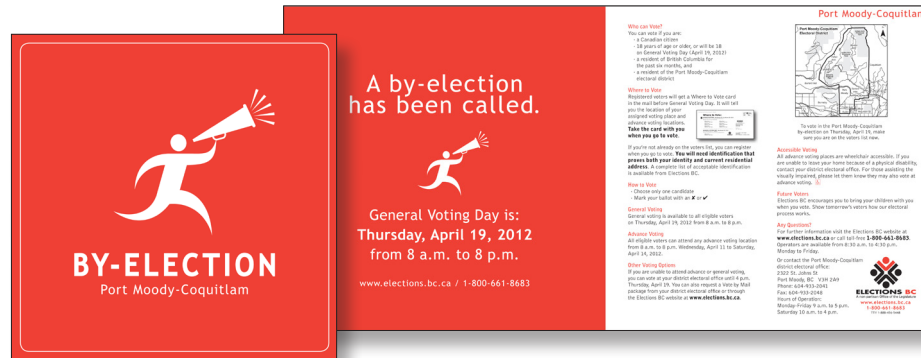

Public information

The *Election Act* requires the Chief Electoral Officer to provide public notice of an election containing information regarding voter registration and voting opportunities. In addition to meeting these statutory requirements, Elections BC is committed to providing an inclusive and accessible electoral process. Therefore, Elections BC implemented a comprehensive communications plan to inform voters in Port Moody-Coquitlam and Chilliwack-Hope of their electoral rights, the electoral process, the times and locations of voting opportunities and where additional information could be found.

Early in the campaign period, Elections BC distributed unaddressed information pamphlets known as 'householders' to each household in both electoral districts. The householder contained the dates and times of advance and general voting, a map of the applicable electoral district, voter eligibility requirements and Elections BC contact information. In total, 21,491 householders were delivered in Port Moody-Coquitlam and 38,442 were delivered in Chilliwack-Hope.

By-elections can have unique communication challenges. Many voters, particularly in urban areas, are not aware of the electoral district in which they reside. When a by-election occurs, Elections BC finds that many voters who live just outside of the boundaries of the electoral district believe they reside in the district where the by-election is taking place and that they are entitled to vote in the by-election, when in fact they are not. This confusion is increased by the fact that campaigns and media coverage often extend beyond the borders of the electoral district into the surrounding areas.

Further, Elections BC householders sometimes get delivered to a small number of voters outside of the electoral district. This occurs because the householders are unaddressed and electoral district boundaries do not coincide exactly with Canada Post postal routes. For example, a postal route in the South Sumas area of Chilliwack may include houses on both sides of a street that is a boundary between two electoral districts. While Elections BC and Canada Post work together to minimize the occurrence of voters outside the electoral district who receive by-election information, Elections BC errs on the side of caution and would rather see a small number of ineligible voters receive information about the by-election than any eligible voters not receive the information.

As all voters must prove their identity and residence prior to voting, ineligible voters who receive a householder or otherwise believe themselves to be eligible voters in the by-election will not be able to vote in the wrong electoral district. However, Elections BC will continue to investigate this issue to determine how it can reduce confusion in future by-elections.

As required by the *Election Act*, Elections BC published advertisements regarding the by-elections in newspapers available in the electoral districts.

Prior to the start of advance voting, Where to Vote cards were mailed to every registered voter in Port Moody-Coquitlam and Chilliwack-Hope. The cards informed voters of their assigned voting place; dates, times and locations of voting opportunities; voting eligibility requirements; and the opportunity to register in conjunction with voting.

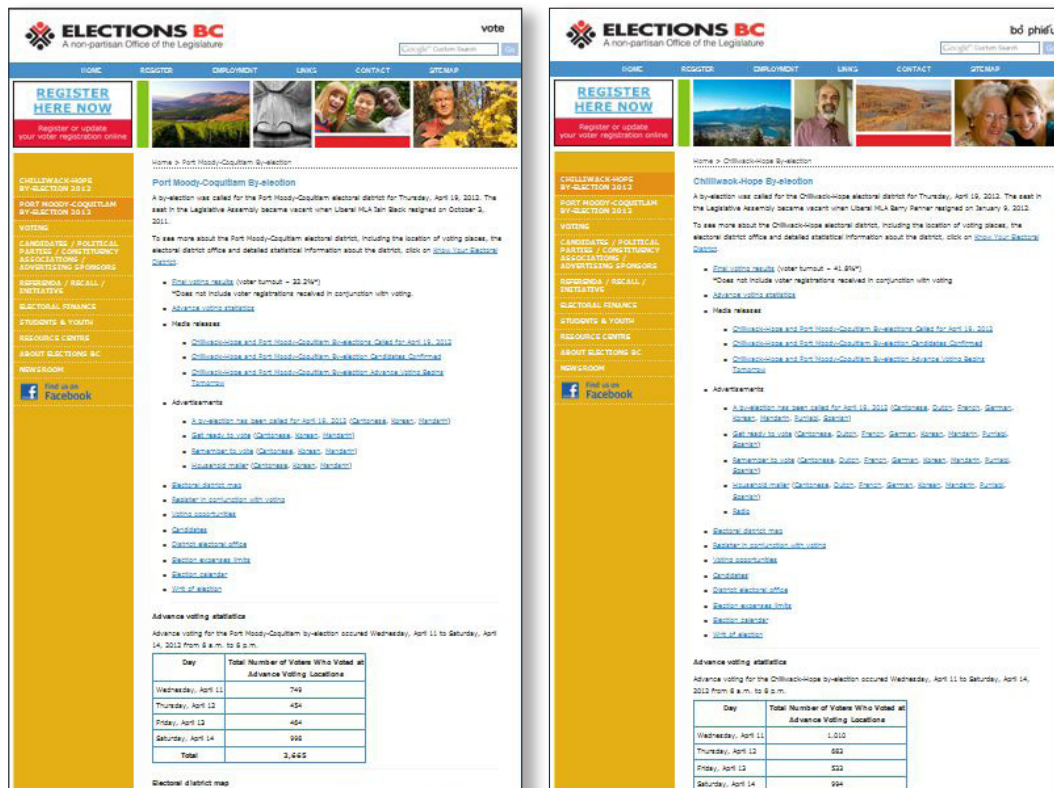
Figure 2: Where to Vote card



To accommodate increased call volumes, Elections BC hired additional staff to answer calls to its 1-800 phone number. Operators were available during regular business hours and for extended hours during advance voting and general voting.

Elections BC's website was enhanced to provide website visitors with a single source for by-election information. Web pages were updated over the course of the campaign period to reflect candidate nominations, election expenses limits, voting place addresses and voting results.

Officials

The Chief Electoral Officer appoints a District Electoral Officer (DEO) to administer elections in each electoral district. One or more Deputy District Electoral Officers are also appointed to provide assistance, and to replace the DEO if the position becomes vacant.

Voting

The *Election Act* provides British Columbians with a wide variety of voting opportunities. Two advance voting locations and 18 general voting locations were provided in the Port Moody-Coquitlam electoral district and four advance voting locations and 17 general voting locations were provided in the Chilliwack-Hope electoral district. Absentee voting was available to voters who voted outside of their assigned voting place, including at voting opportunities in the other by-election. Alternative absentee voting was also available in the district electoral offices and by mail. Mobile teams administered special voting at long-term care facilities in the electoral districts for voters who would not otherwise have been able to vote.

There were 26 rejected ballots and voter turnout was 41.12% of registered voters in Chilliwack-Hope.

Finding efficiencies in voting administration

Speeding up advance voting

One of Elections BC's goals is to ensure the effective and efficient administration of electoral events. Between elections, Elections BC investigates ways that various processes associated with voting can be improved to provide more efficient service. Where processes might be improved without requiring changes to legislation, a by-election is an effective way to trial those improvements on an appropriate scale. In advance of the 2012 by-elections, Elections BC staff began investigating ways to improve the advance voting and voter registration experiences.

The use of advance voting has steadily increased from 6.85% of all votes cast in the 2001 Provincial General Election to 17.57% in the 2009 Provincial General Election. In the 2011 Vancouver-Point Grey by-election, advance voting accounted for over 21% of all votes cast. Although advance voting has become more popular with voters, it does take longer to cast a ballot at advance voting compared to voting on General Voting Day. The use of advance voting also increases the amount of administrative work required in the district electoral office between advance voting and general voting. It was therefore hoped that improvements to the advance voting process could be found that would benefit voters and election officials alike.

Advance voting takes longer because the *Election Act* requires all voters to complete an advance voting certificate prior to receiving a ballot. The advance voting certificate is one of the tools required by the *Election Act* that helps prevent multiple voting. Traditionally, voters line up at the voter registration station to receive the certificate which is completed by a voter registration official. The voter registration official also completes a separate application for voter registration for individuals who are registering or updating their voter registration information. Once a voter receives these forms, the voter lines up at the voting station and, before receiving a ballot, their name and address is written into the voting book, the official record of all individuals who vote at advance voting.

As most of the information written onto the certificate is contained on a voter's Where to Vote card, a new process was trialed whereby a stamp was applied to each Where to Vote card to turn it into an advance voting certificate. Over 80% of voters voted at advance voting using their Where to Vote card. This new process required 1-2 minutes to administer, compared to 3-4 minutes for the old process. This improvement, which does not require legislative change, will be adopted for the 2013 General Election.

Elections BC also piloted combining voter registration forms with (a) absentee voting certification envelopes, and (b) stand-alone advance voting certificates (for those advance voters who did not bring their Where to Vote card). Currently a separate form is used for each process, which results in duplication of effort and the potential for administrative error.

Voter registration officials were pleased that they no longer had to write much of

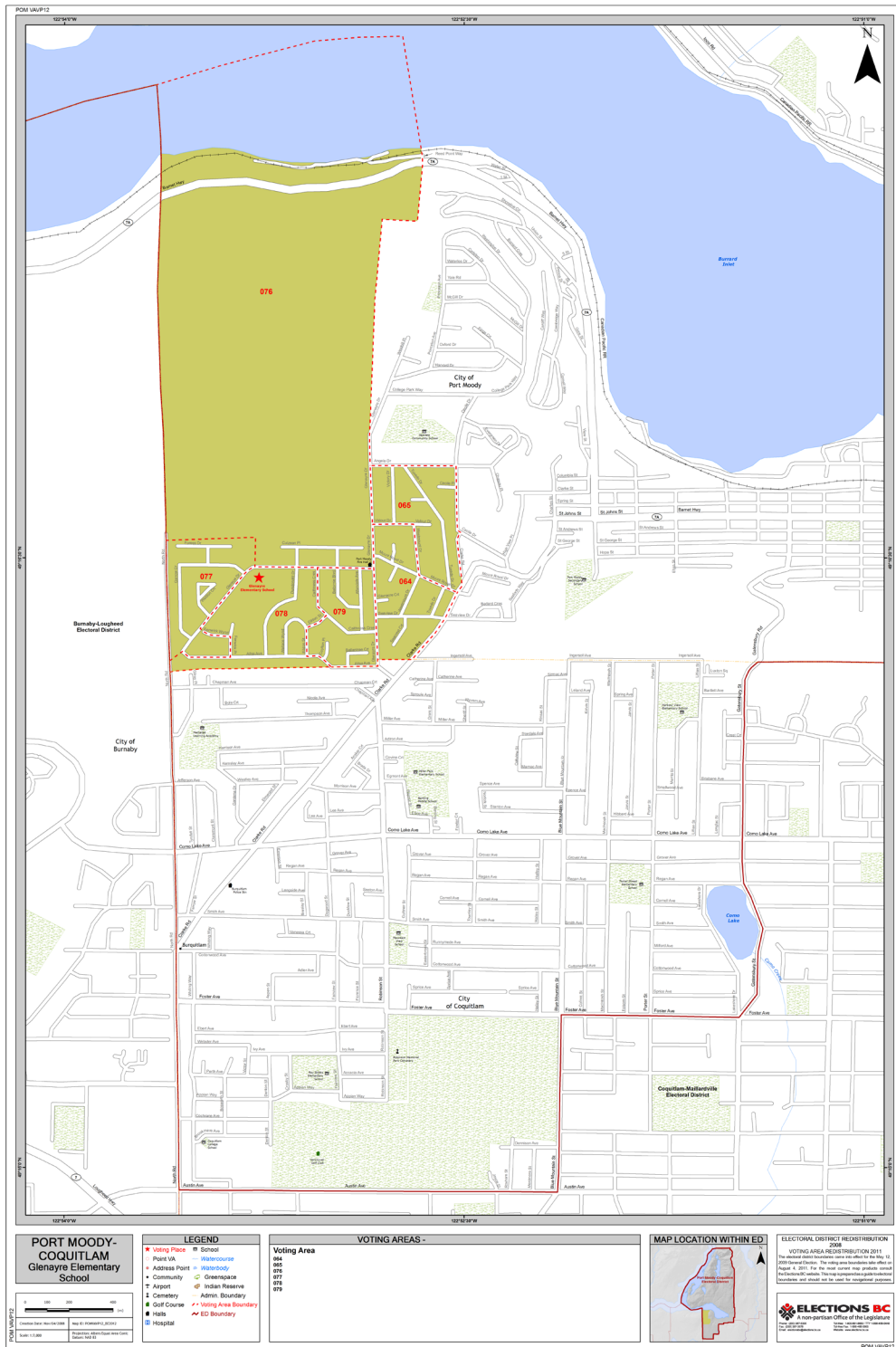
the same information on two forms for voters who were registering or updating their voter registration information. The District Electoral Officers reported that the new processes also made it easier for them to prepare for general voting.

Based on the success of the pilot project, these new processes will also be carried forward to the 2013 General Election.

Voting place catchment maps

Provincial voters in British Columbia are entitled to vote at any voting opportunity using the absentee voting provisions of the *Election Act*. While this provides an excellent service to voters, election officials must be able to quickly, but correctly, determine which voters are voting at their assigned voting place and will use the ordinary procedures, and which individuals are not at their assigned voting place and must vote according to the absentee voting rules. This is especially important if the voter is unregistered or forgot their Where to Vote card. To support the election officials in their work, Elections BC staff designed new wall-sized catchment maps for the voting places used on General Voting Day that clearly indicate which voting areas are associated with a voting place.

These catchment maps enabled voters to simply point to where they live on the map and if it was within the shaded region, the official directed the voter to the correct table in the voting place. If the voter's residence was not within the shaded region, the official directed the voter to the absentee voting table. Election officials and voters found this to be a very helpful tool and therefore catchment maps will be created for each general voting place in every electoral district in the next general election.

Voting results

Summary of results

Ballots from advance voting and general voting are counted at initial count following the close of voting on General Voting Day. Ballots contained in certification envelopes from other voting opportunities such as absentee and special voting are considered at final count. Final count took place on April 30, 2012.

The *Election Act* requires a waiting period of six days between the conclusion of final count and the return of the writ of election. This provides sufficient time for a candidate, voter or the District Electoral Officer to request a judicial recount. A judicial recount was not requested in either electoral district and the writs of election were returned on May 7, 2012.

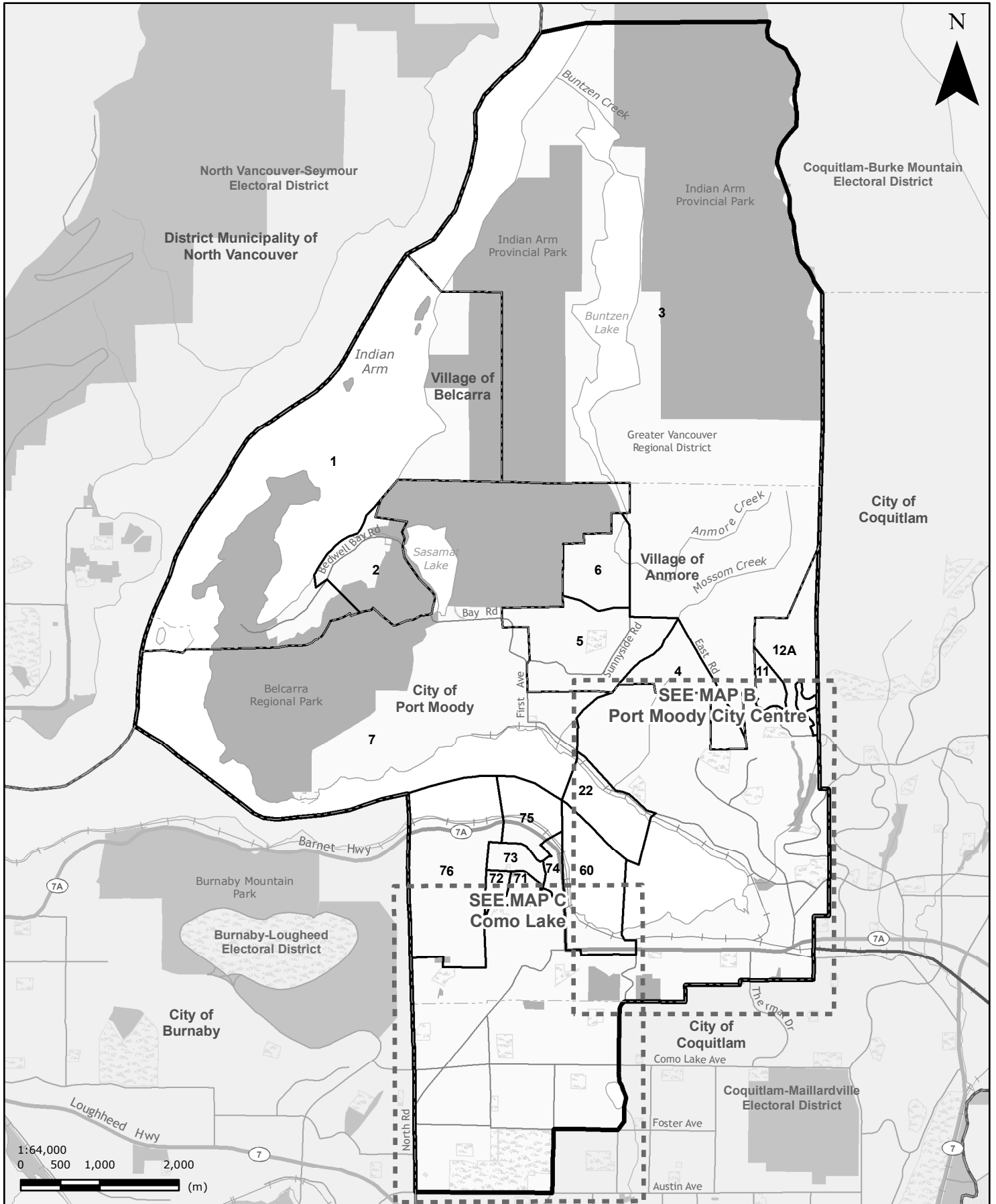

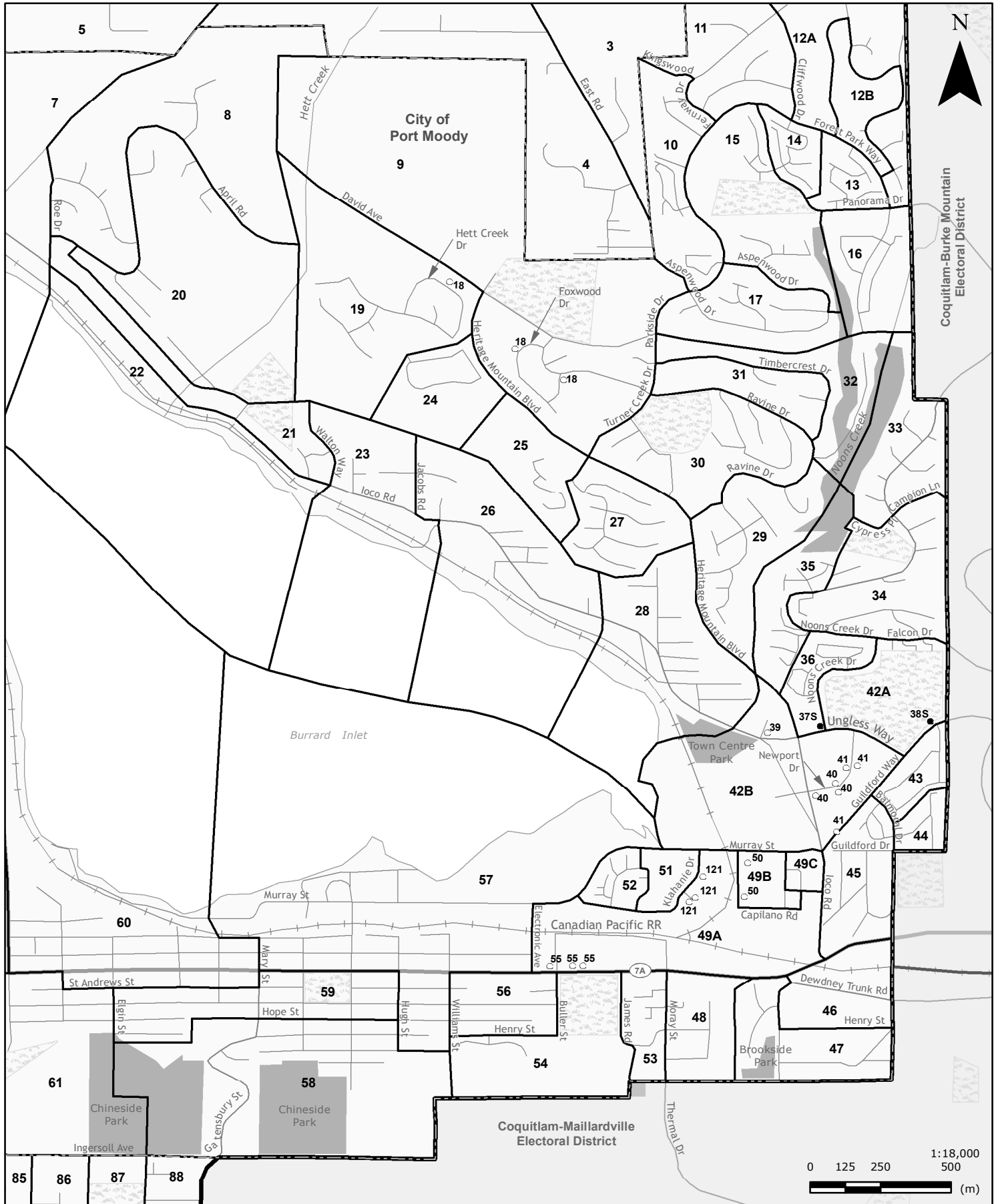

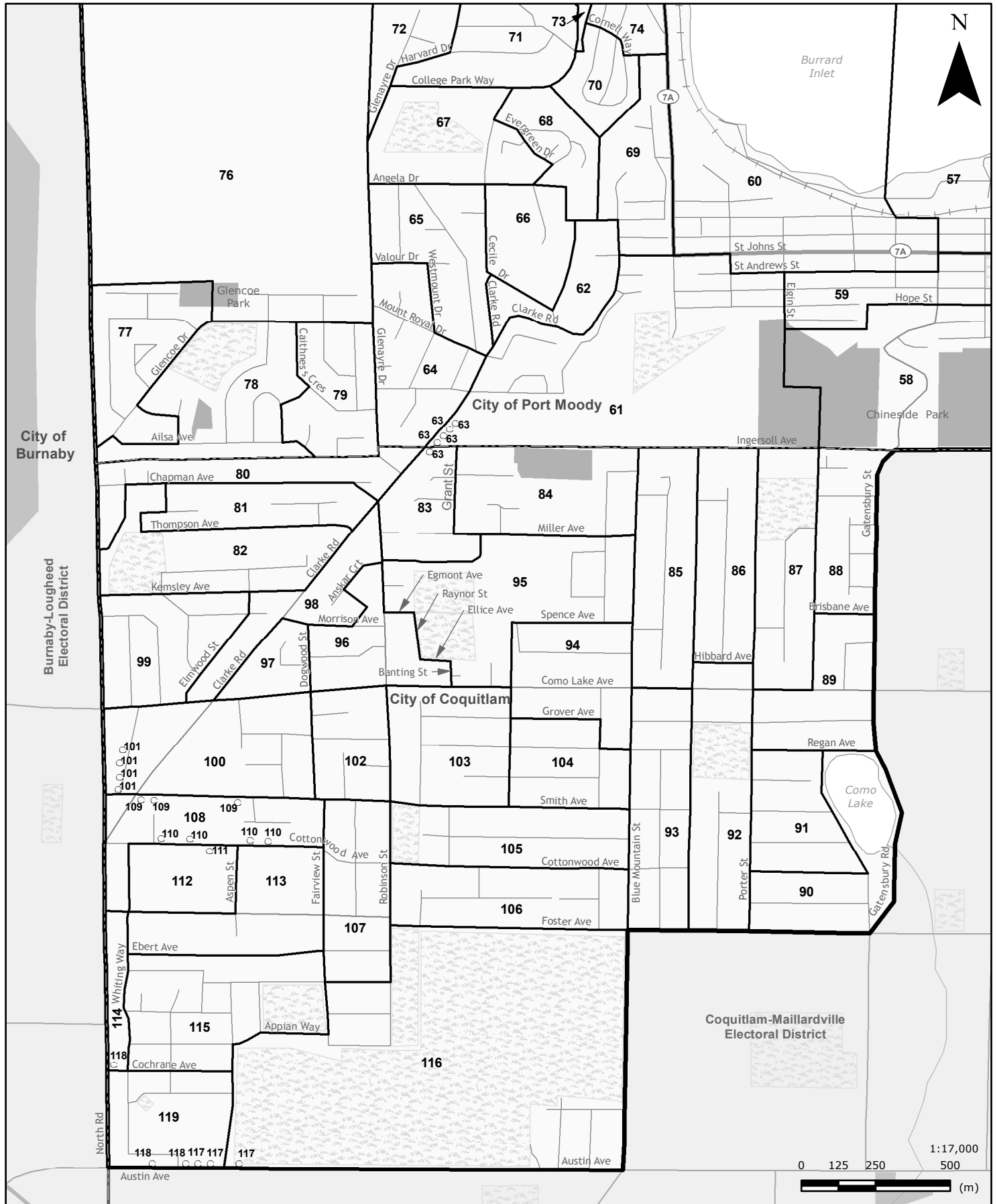
The following pages contain the results of the Port Moody-Coquitlam and Chilliwack-Hope by-elections by voting area. Each voting area is represented by a number, and some are followed by a letter. A voting area corresponding to a grey dot on the accompanying map is a point voting area, which is assigned to a single address or addresses. A voting area followed by the letter S indicates a site-based voting area established at an intermediate or long-term care facility. The ballots cast in some voting areas were combined into a single ballot box where it was necessary to protect the secrecy of the vote or for reasons of efficiency.

Election financing

Introduction

Under the *Election Act*, financial agents for candidates, registered political parties represented by a candidate in the by-election and associated registered constituency associations are required to file election financing reports with the Chief Electoral Officer within 90 days after General Voting Day. Individuals and organizations that sponsor election advertising are required to register with Elections BC. Registered election advertising sponsors who sponsor election advertising with a value of \$500 or more are required to file election advertising disclosure reports within 90 days after General Voting Day.

Following are summaries of election financing reports and election advertising disclosure reports received by Elections BC. The summaries reflect the financing reports as filed and do not include subsequent amendments. After filing, Elections BC staff review the reports for accuracy and completeness. The completed reports and any subsequent amendments are available for viewing on the Elections BC website for up to 10 years. Because Elections BC does not include cents in the summaries, there may be some small differences from the original reports due to rounding.

The financial filing deadline for both by-elections was July 18, 2012.

Election expenses limits

Unlike for fixed-date general elections, the *Election Act* does not establish a pre-campaign period for by-elections. The base election expenses limit for candidates and registered political parties during the campaign period was \$70,000. The base expenses limit for election advertising sponsors was \$3,000. These base amounts were adjusted to reflect changes in the Consumer Price Index.

The expenses limits for both by-elections were:

- \$72,970.82 for registered political parties
- \$72,970.82 for candidates
- \$3,127.32 for election advertising sponsors

Registered constituency associations are prohibited from incurring election expenses except on behalf of a nominee prior to that individual receiving their certificate of candidacy, and any such expenses are considered to be election expenses of the candidate. Therefore, constituency associations do not have an election expenses limit.

Registered political parties

The election financing information in this report includes both the total inflows and total outflows for each registered political party that endorsed a candidate. Total inflows and total outflows may not be equal. This commonly occurs when assets held prior to a campaign period are used, and therefore reported as election expenses but not as inflows. Differences also occur because the reporting periods are different for inflows and outflows.

Total inflows include income and loans received. Except for other income, total inflows are reported from January 1, 2012 to the close of voting on General Voting Day. Other income is miscellaneous income related to the election only.

Political contributions: an amount of money or the value of any property or services provided without compensation by way of donation, advance, deposit, discount or otherwise.

Transfers received: non-reciprocal receipts of money, goods or services from a registered constituency association, a candidate or a leadership contestant.

Fundraising income: the portion of income from fundraising functions that is not reported as political contributions.

Other income: income related to the election from miscellaneous sources.

Loans received: the original amount of loans received for election expenses. Some or all of the loan may have been repaid.

Total outflows are related to the campaign only and are segregated as follows:

Election expenses subject to the expenses limits: the value of property or services used during the campaign period, by or on behalf of a registered political party, registered constituency association, or a candidate to promote or oppose a registered political party or a candidate (e.g. advertising and campaign office expenses). The campaign period is the time between when an election is called (March 22, 2012) and the close of general voting (April 19, 2012). The *Election Act* limits the amount of election expenses a registered political party or candidate can incur during this period.

Election expenses not subject to the expenses limits: election expenses specifically excluded from the election expenses limits (e.g. audit fees). This type of expense is described in section 203 of the *Election Act*.

Other expenses: the value of goods and services used outside the campaign period but in relation to the election.

Transfers given: non-reciprocal provision of money, goods or services to a registered constituency association, a candidate or a leadership contestant.

Registered constituency associations

Registered constituency associations are prohibited from incurring election expenses, except on behalf of a nominee prior to that individual receiving their certificate of candidacy. All election expenses incurred on behalf of a nominee must be included in the candidate's election expenses. Therefore, constituency associations do not report any expenses in their election financing reports. The only outflows reported are transfers given between January 1, 2012 and General Voting Day. Total inflows include income and loans received. Income is from January 1, 2012 to the close of voting on General Voting Day.

Political contributions: an amount of money or the value of any property or services provided without compensation by way of donation, advance, deposit, discount or otherwise.

Transfers received: non-reciprocal receipts of money, goods or services from a registered political party or a candidate.

Fundraising income: the portion of income from fundraising functions that is not reported as political contributions.

Loans received: the original amount of loans received for election expenses. Some or all of the loan may have been repaid.

The only outflows reported by registered constituency associations in election financing reports are:

Transfers given: non-reciprocal provision of money, goods or services to a registered political party or a candidate.

Candidates

The election financing information for candidates in this report includes both the total inflows and outflows. Total inflows and total outflows may not be equal. This commonly occurs when items owned by a candidate prior to a campaign period are used, and therefore reported as election expenses but not as inflows.

Political contributions: an amount of money or the value of any property or services provided without compensation by way of donation, advance, deposit, discount or otherwise.

Transfers received: non-reciprocal receipts of money, goods or services from a registered political party or registered constituency association.

Fundraising income: the portion of income from fundraising functions that is not reported as political contributions.

Other income: income related to the election from miscellaneous sources.

Loans received: the original amount of loans received for election expenses. Some or all of the loan may have been repaid.

Total outflows are segregated as follows:

Election expenses subject to the expenses limits: the value of property or services used during the campaign period, by or on behalf of a registered political party, registered constituency association, or a candidate to promote or oppose a registered political party or a candidate (e.g. advertising and campaign office expenses). The campaign period is the time between when an election is called (March 22, 2012) and the close of general voting (April 19, 2012). The *Election Act* limits the amount of election expenses a registered political party or candidate can incur.

Election expenses not subject to the expenses limits: election expenses specifically excluded from the election expenses limits (e.g. nomination deposits and audit fees). This type of expense is described in section 203 of the *Election Act*.

Other expenses: the value of goods and services used outside the campaign period but in relation to the election.

Transfers given: non-reciprocal provision of money, goods or services to a registered political party or registered constituency association.

Election advertising sponsors

The following definitions are relevant to election advertising sponsors:

Election advertising: for by-elections, the transmission, by any means, of an advertising message to the public that:

- is transmitted during the campaign period, and
- promotes or opposes, directly or indirectly, a registered political party or the election of a candidate. This includes taking a position on an issue with which a candidate or registered political party is associated.

Election advertising does not include news or commentary in a bona fide periodical, documents sent directly by a person or group to their members, employees or shareholders, or the transmission by an individual, on a non-commercial basis on the Internet, or by telephone or text messaging, of their personal political views.

Contributions: money provided to a sponsor of election advertising during the period beginning six months before an election is called and ending on General Voting Day.

Amount of sponsor's assets used: the value of the sponsor's assets used to pay for election advertising. This amount does not include contributions referred to above.

Value of election advertising: the market value of preparing and conducting election advertising.

All election advertising sponsors must be registered. Under section 244 of the *Election Act*, an election advertising sponsor is not required to file a disclosure report if, during the campaign period, the advertising sponsored did not have a total value of \$500 or more.

The summaries of disclosure reports for election advertising sponsors who sponsored election advertising with a total value of \$500 or more are included in this report.

Other than the election advertising sponsors whose reports are summarized in the following tables, the remaining election advertising sponsors registered with Elections BC indicated they did not sponsor election advertising with a total value of \$500 or more or did not file disclosure reports. Since the registered advertising sponsors that did not file disclosure reports were registered prior to 2012 and no election advertising valued at \$500 or more has come to our attention, Elections BC has assumed that they also did not sponsor election advertising with a value of \$500 or more. A full listing of all registered election advertising sponsors is available on the Elections BC website.

Filing deadlines

All election financing reports for both by-elections were due on July 18, 2012. The Chief Electoral Officer granted one extension to a candidate in Port Moody-Coquitlam due to extraordinary circumstances. All other reports were submitted by the filing deadline.

Exceeded expenses limits

At the time of publication, Elections BC has not completed its review of all of the submitted election financing and election advertising disclosure reports. However, Elections BC has reviewed the disclosure reports and accompanying documentation filed by the registered election advertising sponsor British Columbia Government and Service Employees' Union (BCGEU) in relation to the by-elections. Our review determined that the organization sponsored election advertising valued at \$162,235.60 in each electoral district. This exceeds the expenses limit of \$3,127.32 per electoral district by \$159,108.28. The report as summarized on pages 38 and 41 is as reported by the BCGEU.

Elections BC advised the BCGEU that in accordance with section 235.2 of the *Election Act*, unless relief is granted by the B.C. Supreme Court, it will be deregistered as an election advertising sponsor and will not be entitled to be reregistered as a sponsor until after the next general election. The BCGEU will also be subject to a financial penalty of ten times the amount by which the value of the election advertising sponsored by the BCGEU exceeds the election expenses limit.

At the time of publication, as allowed by section 235.3 of the *Election Act*, the BCGEU has applied to the B.C. Supreme Court for relief from the advertising penalties and the matter is before the Court. Further information regarding the conclusion of this issue will be available in Elections BC's 2012/13 Annual Report.

Appendix A: Orders of the Chief Electoral Officer

Section 280 of the *Election Act* establishes the authority of the Chief Electoral Officer to make specific or general Orders under certain circumstances. One Order was made by the Assistant Chief Electoral Officer (Electoral Operations) and one Order was made by the Chief Electoral Officer relating to the Port Moody-Coquitlam and Chilliwack-Hope by-elections. 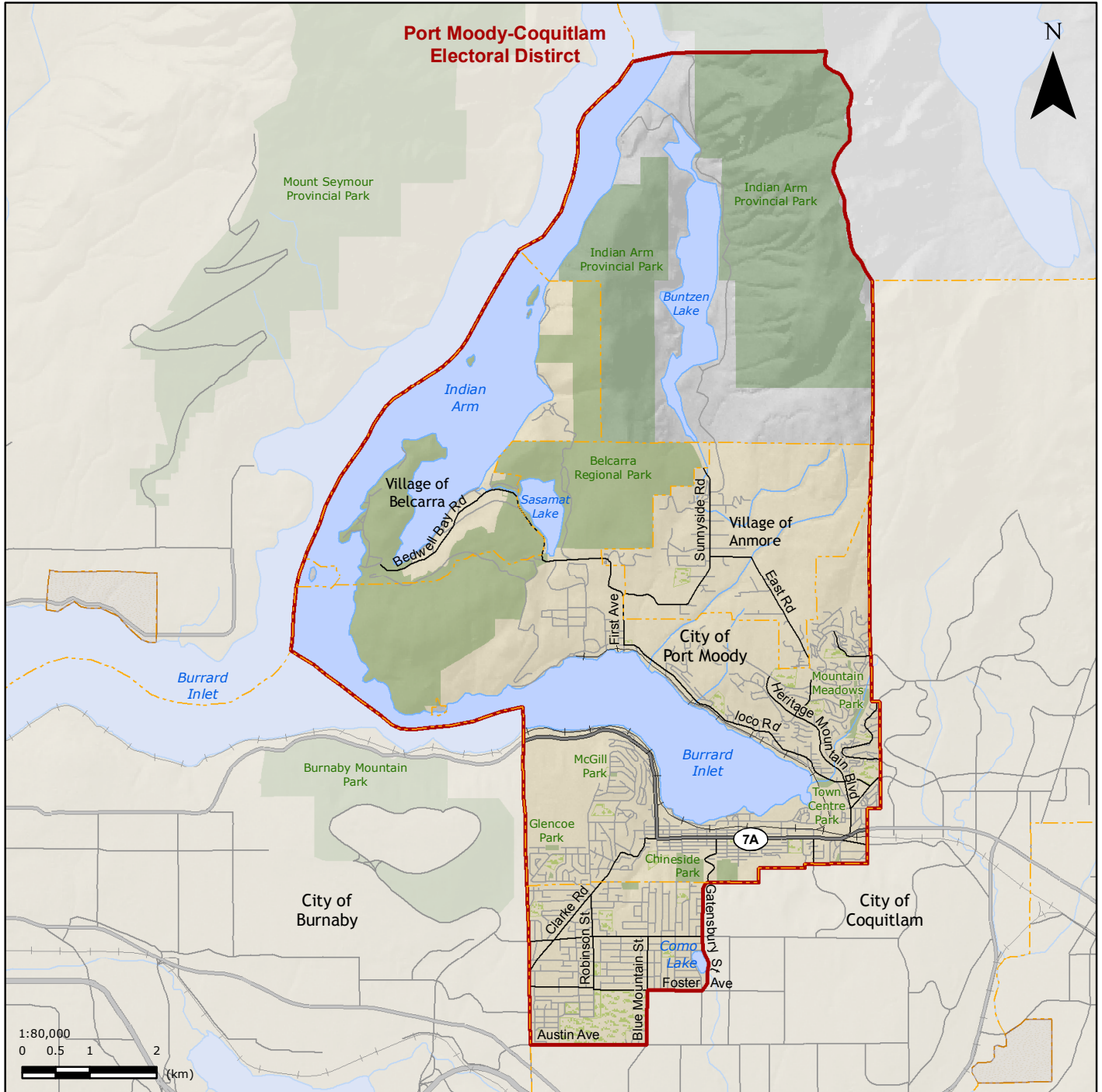
A voter in Chilliwack-Hope applied for a voting package under s. 106 of the *Election Act* using the online application form available from the Elections BC website. The package was mailed on April 4, 2012, but on April 18, 2012 the voter contacted Elections BC to advise that it had not been delivered. The District Electoral Officer immediately issued a replacement package but the voter could not be able to deliver the voting package to the Chilliwack-Hope district electoral office by the close of voting. The voter was permitted to return the voting package provided that it was post-marked by the close of voting for the by-election and was received by the District Electoral Officer prior to final count. The voting package was accepted by the District Electoral Officer as if it had been received by the deadline.

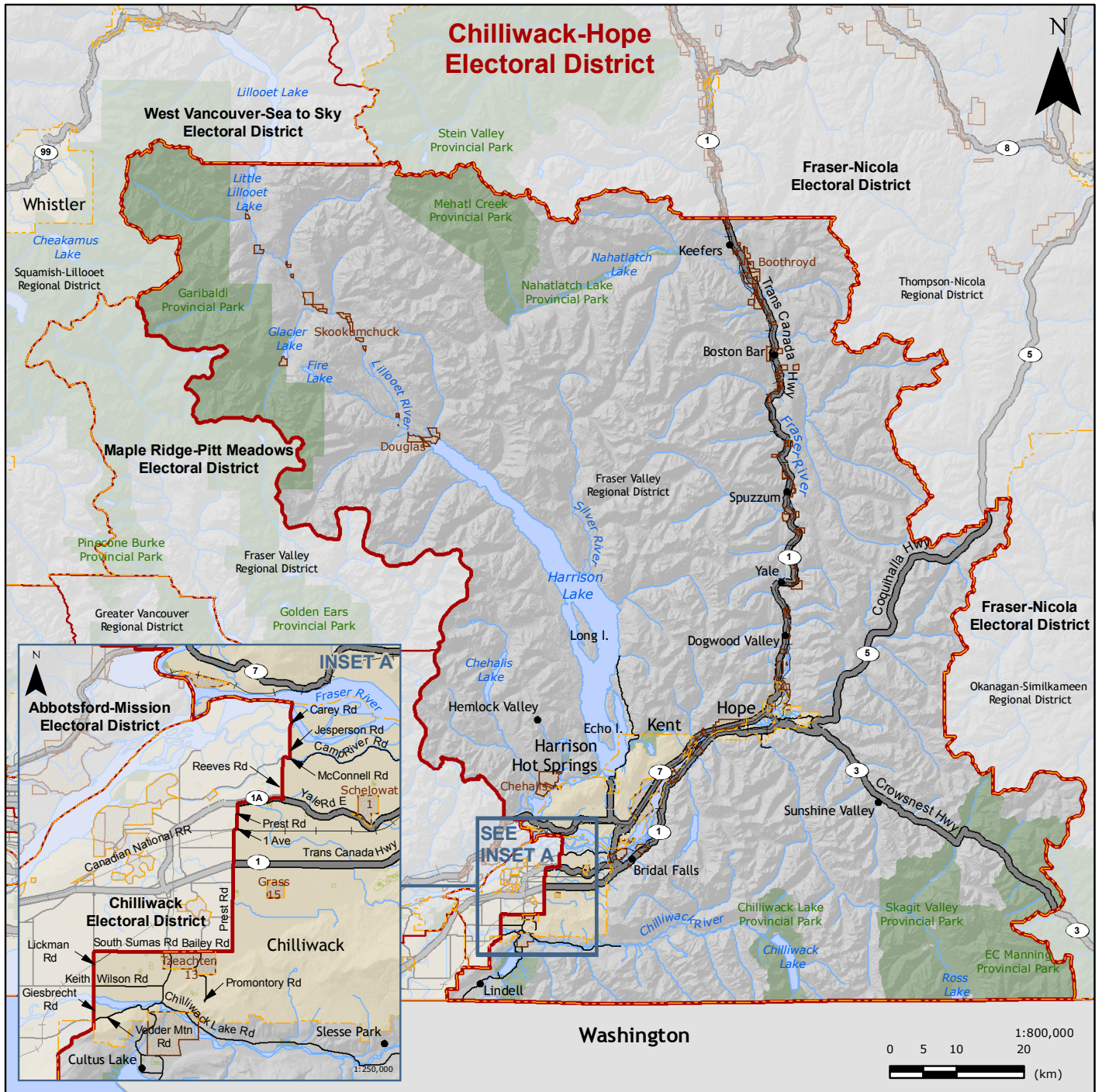



If you don't have any of the above, bring two documents that together prove your identity and current residential address. Any two of the following documents are acceptable:

- health card
- income tax assessment notice, government cheque

School/college/university-issued document examples include:

- transcript, residence acceptance, tuition/fees statement, student card)

- insurance statement
- public transportation pass
- utility bill
- membership cards
- other documents
- provincial Where to Vote card

Voters without identification can be reached for by a voter assistance officer. They will provide the necessary identification, or a family member or someone who has the legal authority to make personal care decisions for the voter.


